

And glorious they were! What a fabulous trip the Tuckahoe and James River gals enjoyed with thanks to the masterful planning of Martha Moore, Madeline Mayhood and their aide-de-camp extraordinaire, Kathy Watson. This trip was also made possible by our association with Garden Club of America and their Visiting Garden's program. If one thing could be learned from this trip, it would be the truly great fortune we have as members of GCA. For those on our trip, I hope you will spend a few moments perusing the GCA website and appreciating the opportunities that abound as members of GCA.

The gardens of Newport were simply unrivaled. In one garden, we ambled through dozens of outdoor

"rooms", utilizing light, color and creative and experimental pruning of maturing plants of all varieties, each room more amazing than the last. We saw the opulent "cottages" and gardens of The Elms, The Breakers and The Marble House all built during the glorious gilded age of Newport. We marveled at the design of the tranquility of **The Blue Garden**, with its color palette devoted entirely to blue flowers. Breathtakingly beautiful and inspiring.

GCV HORTICULTURE FIELD DAY

Horticulture Field Day 2019 was a beautiful sunny day in Orange County. Betty, Ellen and I had a fun road trip to visit the sites in this spectacular area of the Shenandoah Valley. Unfortunately we were unable to visit Mt. Sharon due to our own Annual Meeting overlapping the same day but our visit the following day to the Marketplace at Grelen and Montpelier were wonderful. The day started at Grelen with workshops on proper pruning techniques and container garden tips.

Proper Pruning Tips:

- Always spray Lysol on your pruners between cutting different species.
- Japanese maples like airflow. Prune them before the weather is too hot because they are sensitive trees and will burn from the pruning.
- Never ever ever buzz cut the tops of your crape myrtles!!!
- River birch needs to be limbed up often. They can take a hard pruning.
- Boxwood should be pruned in the late winter. Never prune more than ¼ of the shrub. They need airflow to promote new growth. You can cut out a lot of the inside growth if looking brown.
- Limelight hydrangeas can be pruned well into the spring. They are his favorite hydrangeas by

Two websites, Dave's Garden (https://davesgarden.com/#b) and Missouri Botanical Garden (https://www.missouribotanicalgarden.org/) have excellent information on care of plants.

Container Garden Tips:

- Monochromatic plants make for a beautiful container. Suggestions: all green with fern and grasses, all red annuals with red fountain grass, all green and white plants, all oranges and yellows, all pinks and lavenders, etc.
- Remember the general rule of the THRILLER, FILLER and SPILLER when selecting types of plants.

After lunch, we visited Montpelier's Annie DuPont Gardens. Montpelier's entire property includes 2600 acres with 9 miles of hiking trails. The original gardens were started during President James Madison's administration around 1809. The DuPonts bought this historic landmark in the early 1900's and transformed the 4 acres into a formal 20th Century garden with the help of landscaper Charles Gillette. They added brick walls, iron gates and statuaries from their world travels. The gardens are full of beautiful boxwood, many perennials, shrub roses and herbs. The Garden Club of Virginia helped fund part of the ongoing restoration in 1990.

I encourage you all to take advantage of Horticulture Field Day next year! Block off a day during your busy spring to soak in all the beauty our state offers in public and private gardens.

Fatsia japonica is native to Japan and is an evergreen shrub or small tree that typically grows to 16' tall in its native habitat! It can grow in Richmond as it is winter hardy in Zones 8-10, but it requires protection from wind and sun scorching. Typically, it grows to 3-5' tall here, and slowly. Its thick, glossy, huge leaves are terrific in arrangements.
