

# October Meeting Follow-Up



# The Story of TGC

In 1950, the Tuckahoe Garden Club of Westhampton won the coveted Massie Medal, awarded by the Garden Club of Virginia for distinguished achievement. The citation read, "To the Tuckahoe Garden Club for their success in converting a small city lot into a beautiful and dignified setting for the John Marshall House."

The home of the "Great Chief Justice" located at 818 Fast Marshall Street in downtown

Richmond, is now a historic house museum and a National Historic Landmark. John Marshall built the house in 1790 in the historic Court End neighborhood and lived there for 45 years until his death. The house remained in the Marshall family until 1907 when it was sold to the city of Richmond. In 1911, the property was placed in the care of the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities [APVA], now Preservation Virginia in an effort to save it from demolition.

By 1947, the house and grounds were in desperate need of attention. The property had lost its original beauty and the grounds were in poor condition. The Tuckahoe Garden Club and the APVA had been close allies and undertook their greatest challenge to date. For two years, the John Marshall Committee, headed by Mrs. Pryor Lipscomb and Mrs. Paul Miller, worked to restore the original charm and beauty of the gardens and grounds. The Tuckahoe Garden Club was recognized by the Garden Club of Virginia for the significant contribution of restoring the grounds of this historic property.

## **BOXWOOD BLIGHT IN RICHMOND**

Unfortunately I have discovered often fatal boxwood blight on one English boxwood on the grounds at Agecroft Hall. I took samples and the pathogen confirmed by T. Michael Likins the Director of the Chesterfield County Cooperative Extension and the Davey Tree Lab out of Ohio. We began treatment of the fungus with Daconil on Monday, October 29th, the only recommend treatment at this time. I have heard from our arborist, Alec Selz that boxwood blight was discovered several months ago on Virginia Ave. Please pass this information to the garden club.


The implications of this are severe. Mr. Likins suggested to me that the boxwood blight's devastation will be comparable to the chestnut blight of the previous century and the worst case scenario is Windsor Farms without any boxwood. It is difficult to control this disease due to the sticky nature of spores and vectors like deer which can carry the spores for miles. As always clean your tools with an alcohol or bleach solution.

As temperatures and humidity falls the disease's spread will slow down. But I think it is important to have this on everyone in the garden club's radar for next season.

# GARDEN CLUB OF VIRGINIA NEWS & INFORMATION



GCV CONSERVATION FORUM 2019

We (and many other members) attended the 60th Conservation Forum in Charlottesville and heard from many knowledgeable speakers regarding the negative impact pesticides have and continue to have on our environment. We left feeling quite overwhelmed and distressed but remembered that knowledge is power and we can each make a difference.

## Highlights from the meeting:

**Rick Felker**: The importance of soil and growing conditions on health

He and his wife own and operate Mettawoman Creek Farm which is an organic farm on the Eastern Shore.

Everything starts with the soil and the following are practices they incorporate regularly: \*cover crops

\*crop rotation: by rotating, it balances nutrient load (and confuses bugs)

\*bio-diversity: always be sure something is in bloom 12 months/year

He left us with an important question:

"Do I choose to eat food that promotes my health as well as the environment?" Doing the best and right thing are not the easiest but the rewards are worth it!

**Russ Britton**: Innovative practices and latest advancements in sustainable green spaces including biostimualants and reduced watering needs.

In 2013, he partnered with singer Justin Timberlake, owner of eco-driven Mirimichi Golf course, to develop products and landscaping practices that align with being good stewards of the land. He is working on a large scale to educate and create systems of farming practices that are biological, renewable and non-polluting.

**Pete Myers**: The dangers of Pesticides – even in low doses – to the health of wildlife and people.

Dr. Myers discussed Endocrine Disrupting Chemicals (EDC) i.e. Pesticides, Herbicides, Fungicides, Insecticides and their role in disease. He noted that genes are turned on and off all the time and that factors influencing gene expression are not only hereditary but also, environmental. Exposure to low doses matter a lot! He highlighted the fact that

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testing methods are flawed and outdated (for example they test only active ingredients and are more focused on "high doses").

Good news is that Medical groups are now on board, consumers are demanding safer materials and we have the science to help Chemists make them.

**Rick Fell**: Importance of pollinators and the threats they are facing.

The decline of pollinators is really a decline of insects! Insects play a key role in this system (back to bio-diversity and planting things that bloom all year long). Did you know 30-35% of the food we eat is dependent on insect pollinated plants?

Dr. Fell shared great information about the decline of the Honey Bee as well as the decline of Wild Bees (we have approximately 485 species here in Virginia).

In summary he focused on what to do to protect the pollinators:

- Encourage use of IPPM practices (Integrated Pest and Pollinator Management Practices)
- Increase proportion of natural habitat in landscapes
- Encourage use of sustainable farming (and on a smaller level, sustainable yards).

Take away thoughts:

"Lead by Example"

"Think in terms of Ecosystem-think broadly"

This is the perfect segue for GCA's Conservation Committee's #1 Focus: Great Healthy Backyard.


