

What can 12 determined Tuckahoe Garden Clubbers do on a pretty fall morning? Can you imagine that they could harvest 1,000 pounds of Sweet Potatoes??

That is exactly what we did on October 4th at Shalom Farms in Powhatan, right off of Huguenot Road near Rt 288. Shalom Farms is a non-profit farm and food justice organization working for an equitable food system in Richmond, VA. We arrived at around 9am and started with a tour of the garden hoop houses and grounds which are richly planted with beautiful vegetables and some lovely zinnias. Shalom Farms grows over 600,000 servings of Certified Naturally Grown produce for over 10,000 people in need of fresh food annually, distributed through their own pop up shops. Community Engagement & Long Term Planning

Our committee has spent the last 12 months surveying the needs of different organizations in our City as potential partners for a Centennial Project to celebrate 100 years of TGC in 2028. There are so many wonderful opportunities to engage, and we have landed on a concept we call "100 trees for 100 years". Our goal would be to plant 100 white oaks in and around Richmond over the next 10 years, celebrating each of our 100 years with a tree in our community. Our first commitment for trees would be five trees for the Virginia War Memorial, which is seeking funding for this exact need. We presented this Centennial Concept and the Virginia War Memorial gift plan at our Sept 20th meeting, noting a \$7500 gift required for the first five trees. Moving forward after these initial 5

Pam Seay, President of the VWM Foundation, has offered us the opportunity of being the designated supporter of "The Gold Star Oak Grove". The Gold Star designation, as I am sure you know, is for members of the military who have died during their service to our Country. The Oak Grove will consist of five, 3" caliper, native White Oak (Quercus Alba) trees. The trees will initially be 14 to 16 feet in height and will reach a height of 80 to 100 feet with a wide canopy of 40 to 70 feet. Specimens have been documented to be over 450 years old. The trees will be located together in a very prominent area. The estimated cost per tree is \$1,500.00 for a total gift totaling \$9,000.00. This amount will be matched by one of the Foundations already "on board' and the additional funds will be used for other plantings.

We will have a Membership vote on this project at our October 25th meeting.


